We've covered reknitting for sweaters, typical holes, and insect damage in clothing, so now it's time to address tears.

What Can Be Done About Tears?

I mentioned that "L-Shaped" tears, up to one inch, can be effectively rewoven providing the tear is clean — without jagged edges. (Remember that gabardine is tough to repair.)

Tears from file cabinets, desks and sharp edges are often "clean" enough to reweave.

- If the tear is too jagged to reweave, a good seamstress can often add a patch from underneath. It's not a weave, but it may save the garment.
- If the tear is close to a side seam, the seamstress may be able to taper an area and blend the tear into the seam.
- If the tear is nowhere near a seam, it may be possible to add a "dart." Or, in a pinch, a patch or design could be added or embroidered over the problem area.

Tears Larger Than One Inch

Large tears can still be rewoven, but you should assess the value of the garment because price becomes an issue. The other concerns with larger tears are strength and longevity. Stress areas such as the crotch, seat, knee and elbow may not hold a weave.
